Melanie Hare, member of the Ad Hoc Grand Trunk Renewal Committee and Chair of the Vision, Planning and Architecture Working Group, presented the Ad Hoc Committees findings and recommendations. Highlights of the presentation included:

- the Ad Hoc Committee being established in October 2023 to support the Grand Trunk Renewal project;
- an overview of the mandate of the Ad Hoc Committee;
- an overview of the projects completed by the Ad Hoc Committee;
- an overview of the Ad Hoc Committee's role in supporting the community engagement for the project as well as their work with other stakeholders and field experts;
- an overview of the work completed by the Ad Hoc Committee with respect to the direction provided by Council;
- an overview of the recommendations from the Ad Hoc Committee with respect to the project;
- the members of the Ad Hoc Committee being thanked for contributions; and
- the Ad Hoc Committee having a good representation of the broad range of interests in the community for the future of the project.

Ray Harsant spoke to Council regarding the report. Highlights of the presentation included:

- an overview of Mr. Harsant's proposal on how the Grand Trunk Renewal project can be supported by the Ad Hoc Committee moving forward;
- it being important to have consultation with indigenous stakeholders as part of the project;

- it being important to include considerations for open space and parkland in the project;
- a proposal to extend the term of the Ad Hoc Committee until March 2026 especially with the consulting firm bringing back more information;
- there being a need to look at how to ensure greater participation from the community as the project moves forward; and
- an overview of the results of the survey and the concerns highlighted by the survey respondents.

Members of Council, staff, and the delegates held a discussion regarding the following:

- the benefit of having the Ad Hoc Committee continue to guide Council on what can be done for the project;
- the Ad Hoc Committee members being thanked for the time they contributed to support the project;
- the Terms of Reference of the Committee being too vague and unspecific;
- it being the time to go out to the development community to get an idea on what can be done for the property;
- the Ad Hoc Committee not having the opportunity to fully forward the knowledge they have gained;
- it being suggested that the Terms of Reference be reviewed or a different format for the committee be considered;
- there being a need to have a more focused committee both in form and mandate;
- there being a need to review the Terms of Reference for the committee and the associated processes;

- the project being a Council responsibility and the Ad Hoc Committee's mandate being to provide recommendations related to the project;
- there being different aspects of the projects that are intertwined and it being important to think of the project as a whole;
- the Collingwood project being discussed as an example of a development of a brownfield site;
- a clear articulation of what Council wants being needed so that partners know that Council has a clear vision which will inspire confidence from potential partners;
- project funding being a big factor that will impact the development of the site;
- a record of site condition needing to be done to give investment partners assurance;
- there being remedial actions required for the site which will be expensive; and
- the Chief Administrative Officer noting that staff will bring a fulsome report to Council regarding next steps.

- an overview of the actions outlined in the Transportation Master Plan including Action 25 which relates to the reduction of speed limits in residential areas;
- it being requested that Action 25 be prioritized during the 2026 budget;
- an overview of the four pillars that make the reduction of speed limits a sensible option;
- the reduction of speed limits resulting in a reduction in the number and severity of collisions;
- the reduction of speed limits also reducing CO2 emissions;
- the initiative helping create a safe and walkable City;

- the plan being inexpensive in comparison to other traffic calming measures;
- a plan already being available and was previously costed out by staff; and
- there being significant support for the initiative from residents and community groups across the City.

- other traffic calming measures requiring significant investments in infrastructure while Action 25 involves lower costs;
- arterial streets being excluded from the plan; and
- with the Province's plan to eliminate speed cameras, it being especially important to consider other initiatives to slow vehicles down.
